Policy for the Guild's fleet

As accepted by the Guild committee 18 August 2014¹

1.0 Guild objects

1.1 Guild objects are attached. Key words relevant to the fleet policy are:

- Wooden boats
- preservation
- Skills development
- Development of methods
- Recording
- Encourage use
- Discussion

2.0 Acceptance of vessel

- 2.1 Trailable (defined as requiring no special registration or transport arrangements) wooden boats (any condition) accepted where storage allows.
- 2.2 Boats that are not trailable or required to be kept in the water only accepted where (committee/membership) approves by majority vote
- 2.3 Preference is given to boats that display some uniqueness in terms of one or more of the following criteria:
 - Rarity
 - Design
 - Materials used
 - Construction method
 - Condition
 - Not currently represented in the fleet
 - Of particular Tasmanian connection

3.0 Disposal of vessel

- 3.1 Boats accepted into the Guild fleet only on the understanding that any vessel accepted can be disposed of by any means as determined by the Guild committee. Any means includes:
- Sale
- Gift
- Broken up. If broken up, materials will be salvaged for reuse as 1st priority.
- 3.2 Prior to disposal of any vessel the Guild will record in its register details of the vessel, both physical and any known or speculated social/cultural history.

4.0 Register of vessels

- 4.1 Matters for recording
 - Unique Guild number
 - Key dimensions
 - Construction details
 - Vessel history social/cultural
 - Photos/line drawings

5.0 Restoration

5.1 Guild vessels may be restored. The level of restoration and processes for restoration to be determined by the Guild committee.

5.2 Levels of restoration

Level 1 Minimum to stabilize the vessel, record and store.

Level 2

Partial restoration, sufficient to preserve character. Extent of restoration to be determined by committee based on feasibility, resources (including protective storage), importance of vessel as a representative example and whether to be retained as part of permanent collection.

Level 3

Restoration to useable condition. Restoration to a useable on-water standard whilst retaining the key characteristics of the vessel.

Level 4

Restoration to standard that would represent the standard of the vessel when first launched.

6.0 Skills development

- 6.1 In determining the level of restoration the Guild will seek to skill members in the craft of boat building as used in the vessel's original construction.
- 6.2 Restoration process to be documented and members informed of progress and process.

7.0 Vessels stored but owned by others

- 7.1 As space and importance to the restoration of a vessel allows, the Guild committee may approve members' boats to be stored and worked on.
- 7.2 The owner of the vessel will carry full responsibility including public liability insurance to level set by the committee.
- 7.3 The Guild offers no responsibility for the protection of vessels not owned by the Guild.
